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N.C. Health & Wellness Trust Fund Commission Awards \$12.34 Million to Organizations Statewide in the Name of Healthier Lifestyles

(Raleigh, N.C.) – The N.C. Health & Wellness Trust Fund Commission (HWTF) today announced that 91 grants were awarded to 87 organizations totaling \$12.34 million to be used across the state in conjunction with the Commission's commitment to making the state both physically and economically stronger by funding programs that promote wellness and preventive health habits.

Awarding today's grants, the Commission will be providing direct services in 97 of North Carolina's 100 counties. Although, the remaining three counties have not applied for grant funding, medication assistance and teen tobacco services will nonetheless be delivered to residents of these counties through organizations located elsewhere.

Grant funds will be used to further the goals of three of the HWTF's major programs. These programs are:

- **Fit Together**, an overweight/obesity prevention initiative created by a public-private partnership between the HWTF and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of North Carolina (BCBSNC), promotes healthy nutrition and physical activity.
- The **Teen Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Initiative** includes the recently launched Tobacco Reality Unfiltered (TRU) television campaign. TRU is designed to educate young people about the dangers of tobacco, to prevent tobacco use, and to help users quit. Teen advocates play a leading role in the initiative's programs, including the drive for 100% Tobacco Free Schools.
- The **Medication Assistance Program (MAP)** provides education on medication use and possible drug interactions, and identifies optimum prescription drug coverage options for seniors and other low-income citizens.

These grant awards are the result of a careful selection process that involved 122 applications from every region across the state.

"We are excited to allocate these resources to such dedicated organizations. Together, we are building the capacity for communities across our state to meet the health needs of our people and, in doing so, to make for a stronger future," said Lt. Gov. Beverly Perdue, who chairs the Commission.

Included in the grant awards are 16 mini-grants to develop and enforce 100% Tobacco Free Schools policies in local school districts. This brings the total number of grants awarded under this initiative to 53, with total grant funding of \$14.6 million.
